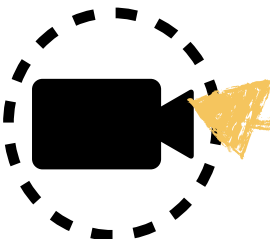

What books have you written?

The Incredible Freedom Machines, Kindred, Bindi and more on the way!

What was the first story you wrote?

I imagine my first stories were recounts written at school, we had a wild childhood filled with bush walks, beach trips and horse riding – all of which are resurfacing in my newest book, *Bindi*.

When did you first get published?

The Incredible Freedom Machines in 2018 – I had an unorthodox journey into publishing. I reached out to Matt Ottley, who took my work to his publisher. I was super lucky to have had his support for my first book, and to have had the chance to continue to work with that delightful editor and many since.

What advice do you have for digital writers and storytellers?

Trust your voice and story matter. I doubted my own for a long time, but everyone has something important to say, and everyone can be an author.



Lesson Experience One

At the beginning of her video, Kirli Saunders acknowledged her ancestors and Country, which is an important part of understanding and respecting place. An Acknowledgement of Country is something you might hear at school, and is the way we pay our respects to the traditional custodians of the land we learn and play on. It's an important part of our ongoing connection to Aboriginal people and place.

Lesson Experience Two

Place can sometimes be described as its own 'character' in a poem, book or piece of creative writing. Think about your own landscapes and settings for your own stories. What does the place look like? How does it make you feel? Do you have more than one setting? Imagery is a great technique that helps to build a picture and sense of a place for a reader or listener.

1 Choose one of the landscapes below and use the *Sketches School* App to create a word bank of descriptions and imagery that relate to your landscape, or place. You might want to draw a sketch of the place. Choose colours and fonts that match your description.

Lesson Experience Three

Kirli says the ocean speaks to her and guides her. Authors and poets use personification to paint pictures with words, by giving those words a human quality. Personification is a brilliant way to engage readers and write in a way that creates images and builds a connection to the language.

1 Choose an object like a piece of fruit or something from your pencil case, take a photo of it using the *Camera App*. Move the image into the *Sketches School App* or into your photo gallery and use the *Mark Up* tool to give the object some human characteristics.

2 **“The ocean kisses the land with a saltwater sting.”**

Using the images that you worked with in *Lesson Experience 2*, write some sentences that personify the landscape.

3 Personify your own landscape as a wise and knowing space that guides your characters on their journey. Use the place you are in or one of your created settings. Write using a new page in your journal or in the *Notes App*.

Poetry is another form of expression which allows us to engage a reader and share our own thoughts and feelings about characters, settings, memories and experiences.

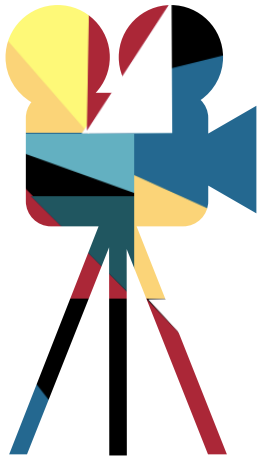

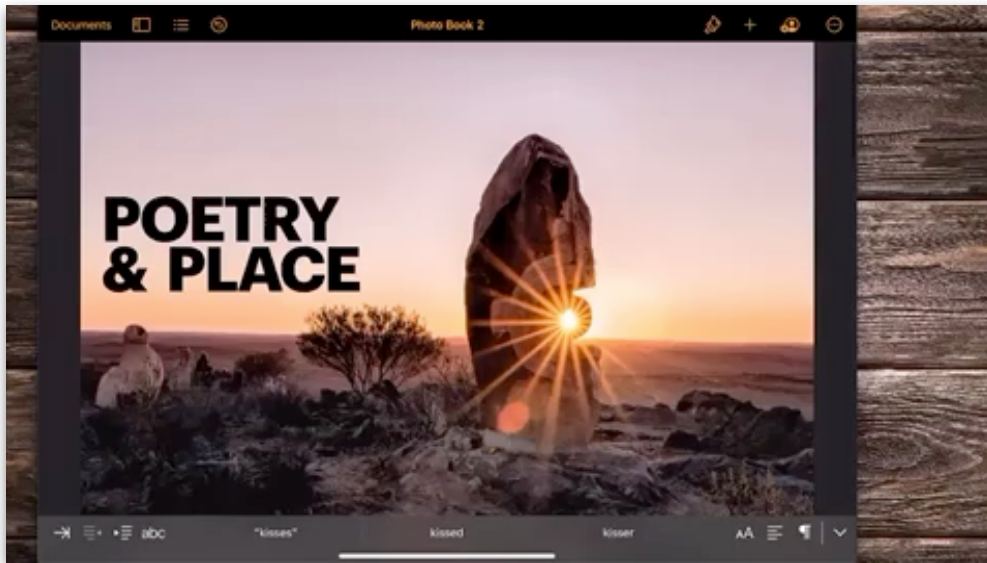

Additional Activities

- Use *Safari* to research more about Australian Indigenous languages and dialects. Find a language/dialect map and locate where your school and place is. This will help you in writing your Acknowledgment of Country. This is also a great opportunity to connect to your local Aboriginal community, Elders or networks like the AECG or Local Land Council. Preserving local Indigenous knowledge and language is very important, so use some of your technology tools to capture this knowledge
- There are so many forms of poetry to explore place, people or purpose. Use some of your created settings or characters to write some poetry and use recording Apps or tools to recite/perform it.
- Explore blank verse, performance poetry, or try writing a Shakespearean sonnet!
